During Al Folger's memorial service October 5, 1991, Josh Alper remembered "those oft-repeated, sometimes humorous—and sometimes irritating—expressions which were peculiar to Al". Here is a sampling.

Choosing a bunk upon arriving at a hut, he always sought what he referred to as an Hawaiian bunk—stretcher.

If the weather was poor on the hike in or if hiking at night, it was trail by braille or the fog was so thick, I had to take a step back to see where I was going.

Al urged us not to heed signs directing hikers to follow cairns in bad weather, for he had stood behind a cairn in a sudden snow squall for fifteen minutes, and when the cairn didn't move he hiked on by it.
